The 2016 Academy for the Australian and New Zealand College of Organists will be held in the city of Dunedin, between Thursday, 21st January and Sunday, 24th January 2016. The Academy, which will feature interactive classes, talks and concerts, will be a chance of organists, particularly young organists, to develop a wide range of practical skills, to develop their critical understanding and appreciation for a wide range of organ music, and to interact with peers and tutors alike. The 2016 Academy will be tutored by five highly-experienced teachers, each of whom bring an exciting and diverse base of knowledge. The Academy will be taught in conjunction with various highly contrasting organs throughout the city including, but not limited to, the instruments at St Paul's Cathedral, Dunedin Town Hall and All Saints' Church. The city of Dunedin itself offers stunning

Meet the tutors...



Thomas Heywood enjoys an outstanding reputation as one of the world's finest concert organists. He has an ever-growing repertoire of over 5,000 works and was the first Australian musician

in history to live as a professional concert organist. As a teacher, he is on staff at the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music at the University of Melbourne. Heywood is also Organist and Director of Music of St Andrew's Anglican Church, Brighton - one of Australia's oldest and most famous churches.



Martin Setchell has delighted audiences the world over with his spirited playing, lively personality and entertaining repertoire. Martin holds Honours degrees in both French and

Music from the University of Exeter, Subsequently he undertook advanced studies in Classical organ technique with Pierre Cochereau Marie-Claire Alain, Piet Kee, and Peter Hurford. Martin emigrated to New Zealand in 1974 on his appointment to the University of Canterbury School of Music where he is currently Adjunct Associate Professor of Music and University Organist.



David Burchell is Organist at St Joseph's Cathedral and acting Director of Music at All Saints' Church. He is the Dunedin City Organist, the University of Otago's Graduation Organist and organ tutor in the Department of Music.

Brought up in Newcastle upon Tyne, he is a graduate of Oxford University and there enjoyed a lengthy association with the renowned Choir of New College Oxford, first as Organ Scholar and later as Assistant Organist. From 1999 to early 2011 he was organist and Choir Director at St Paul's Cathedral, Dunedin.

College at the University of Otago, and Music Director of the Southern Youth Choir. He is also an Associate of the Royal College of Organists, the Otago and Southland Councillor for both RSCM New Zealand and ANZCO, and an international concert organist. Notably, George has been taught by David Flood, Anne Marsden-Thomas, Gerard Brooks, Roger Williams, and, most recently, Peter Stoltzfus Berton. He is also active as a composer of cathedral music and avant-garde composition.

Congratulations to ANZCO Councillor and Holy Trinity Cathedral Director of Music, Timothy Noon, on his appointment to the prestigious position of Director of Music in Exeter Cathedral, UK, from 1 January 2016.

Tim has produced the *Bulletin* for ANZCO since its inception and the council would like to thank him for his hard work.

Tim writes:

"There are very few Cathedral music jobs that would tempt me away from all that Auckland and NZ has to offer, but Exeter has always been one of my very favourite, offering the chance of working with a flourishing choir school, with twin treble lines of boys and girls, professional altos, tenors, and basses, and a rich daily music programme. The cathedral organ is wonderful, the city is thriving and beautiful, and the job comes with a rent-free five bedroom house in the Cathedral Close. The last time this job became vacant was in 1998 and if I waited that long to apply for it again I would be nearly 60!

It has been a privilege to have been part of the Holy Trinity Cathedral team as it takes important steps towards completion and consecration. I am very sad not to be able to see the new organ project through to completion but very much hope to come and play it once it has been completed.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my time in New Zealand and have made many friends for life here. Liz and I will be frequent visitors to her family in Hamilton and very much hope to keep in contact with the Auckland musical community. It has been a pleasure to have been involved with organisations such as ANZCO."
